We Demand that the Girls Kidnapped and Missing in Northern Nigeria Be Immediately Returned to Safety

We, the International Women's Year Liaison Group, Japan (IWYLG), upon learning about the kidnapping of girls by "Boko Haram," and strongly condemn persons claiming responsibility to the incident, and greatly sympathize with those whose family members are suffering. We strongly condemn the tactics taken by the perpetuators from the standpoint of human rights.

It has been reported that more than two hundred girls were forced to leave their boarding school by gunpoint in Chibok, Borno in the northern part of Nigeria and that whereabouts of most of these girls are still unknown after one month.

We cannot overlook the fact that these girls were kidnapped because they were at a Christian institution or of unverified reports referring to their being converted to Islam, or sold as brides if not trafficked as sex slaves are circulating. Yoyogi 2-21-22 Shibuyaku, Tokyo 151-0053 JAPAN

We sincerely hope that the Japanese Government and those who share our concern to speak up for the return of these girls to safety.
